Greening the O'Brien House

CREATING A SUSTAINABLE SHOWCASE HOME FOR THE UNIVERSITY AND COMMUNITY



For nearly 200 years the O'Brien House, the traditional residence of UMM's president, has stood at the top of College Hill as a historic icon, weathering the transformative changes that have swept across this campus. Four institutional name changes and many presidents later, the home has remained unchanged... until now.

In keeping with the University's Environmental Liberal Arts focus, the O'Brien House

is about to undergo a transformation of its own—into a twenty-first-century showcase home for sustainability.

In collaboration with the Town of Machias, the Machias Bay Area Chamber of Commerce, and UMM's Board of Visitors, UMM has launched "Greening the O'Brien House," an initiative to transform the historic O'Brien House into a demonstration model to teach students and community members how to renovate an old home with practical, economical steps toward energy efficiency and sustainability.

More than 7,000 homes in Washington County were built before 1940, with the majority of them lacking in energy efficiency, or in many cases, even proper winterization. The O'Brien House transformation will give residents the opportunity to see many practical improvements and the ability to apply the same energy-efficient renovation strategies to their own homes.



over the next three years, beginning with the fall 2009 semester and concluding in spring 2012. Solar panels, a wind turbine, and an Energy Star metal roof are just a few of the improvements on tap.

Each module will begin with an educational seminar in the O'Brien House, providing a basic overview of the problem, the solution, and a detailed renovation schedule. Community members will be invited to watch the renovation and learn how to do it themselves.

When the installation of a module is complete, UMM students will go out into the community and help with the actual renovation work at homes throughout Washington County. Now, that's experiential learning!

From installing an energy-efficient boiler to the harnessing of wind power, transforming the O'Brien House will make the campus and community a much greener place.

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Greening the O'Brien House is a three-year project that will update the home's heating, electrical, and roofing systems. One primary module of Greening the O'Brien House will be implemented each semester

IFA STUDENTS HOLD 'THOU ART FAIR'



More than 150 high school students from throughout Washington County flocked to UMM for the 6th Annual Thou Art Fair in April. An annual showcase of creativity and talent, the fair is organized by students and faculty in the Interdisciplinary Fine Arts program.

Interactive exhibits for painting, drawing, and cardboard graffiti were just some of the offerings in the Reynolds Center. Live music performed by various student groups filled the gymnasium with an energetic vibe.

Taking part in the fair were students from six area high schools: Machias, Washington Academy, Calais, Lubec, East Grand, and Lee Academy.

Without any funding, the Green Council established a recycling program on campus, using decorated cardboard boxes as recycle bins, a borrowed pick-up from the Physical Plant, and a borrowed scale to monitor the recycling system. During the ten-week competition, the Green Council rallied enough support to win the state competition and come in tenth nationally.

RYAN MARTIN RECEIVES HEART AND SOUL AWARD



Ryan Martin (Ellsworth, Maine), a sophomore in the environmental studies program, has received the Heart and Soul Award for civic engagement from the Maine Campus Compact.

Each year Maine Campus Compact recognizes up to four college students for exemplary civic engagement. These students demonstrate 1) an innovative approach to building or enhancing campus-based efforts to address community issues and needs; 2) use of diverse strategies of engagement (service, service-learning, policy work, advocacy, etc.); 3) demonstrated ability to lead, inspire and engage other students and/or members of the institution; 4) efforts to sustain their engagement through the institution by developing strategies to build their work into the institution's structure.

Martin is responsible for co-founding the Green Council, UMM's first student-run environmental group. The group ran Recycle Mania, a ten-week-long competition between colleges across the nation to see who could recycle the most per capita.

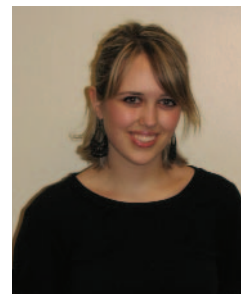
MICHELLE BUCKLEY NAMED 2009 IVY ORATOR

Michelle Buckley (Becker, Minnesota) has been named the Ivy Orator for the Class of 2009. A senior behavioral science major, Buckley was selected by her peers in the senior class.

Buckley will graduate from UMM in May with a bachelor's degree in behavioral science, with a concentration in applied psychology and a minor in biology.

UMM Faculty and Staff

UMM adjunct lecturer and alumnus **Freda S. Hauser '97** co-edited the book *At Home and Abroad in the Empire: British Women Write the 1930s*, which was released in January by the University of Delaware Press. She also contributed an essay titled "Worldly Chickens in a Homely Empire: Accounts of Colonialism in Sylvia Townsend Warner's *The Salutation*" to this collection of critical essays.



Kevin Athearn, Assistant Professor of Natural Resource Economics, recently gave two presentations on environmental certification of fisheries. In August 2008 he attended the American Fisheries Society Annual Meeting in Ottawa, Canada, and gave a presentation there titled "Economic Factors Affecting Eco-Label Success at

Achieving Sustainable Fisheries Goals." In January he gave a seminar presentation at the University of Maine School of Marine Sciences titled "Judging a Fish by Its Cover: Can MSC Certification and Labeling Improve Marine Conservation?"

Professor **Robert Hauhart** has been named "Summer Scholar" at the Vermont Law School's Environmental Law and Policy Program for 2009. He plans on using some of that time to develop a course that he will offer for UMM's Behavioral Sciences and Community Studies program, "Environmental Law/Environmental Crime." He currently teaches several sociology courses online.



Doug McNaught (left), Assistant Professor of Marine Ecology, and **Wendy Norden**, Assistant Research Professor of Marine Conservation Science, are partnering with Maine high schools, volunteer citizens and other research institutions to offer an opportunity for high school students to learn about and

conduct ecological research along the coast of Maine.

Through the Marine Invasive Species Monitoring program, Maine high school students receive hands-on experience with "real" science, which takes them out of the classroom and exposes them to real world marine conservation issues and problems.

Results of this collaborative research will be communicated to and used by organizations interested in the conservation and management of marine ecosystems.



Tora Johnson, Director of UMM's GIS Service Center, has received a \$25,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to purchase Apple laptops for the education program.

Since 2002, the Maine Department of Education's Maine Learning Technology Initiative (MLTI) has provided all 7th and 8th graders and all high school teachers in the state with Apple laptops. UMM's teacher education program currently has no Apple computers to use in training teachers, which means that teachers are graduating from the program and entering classrooms with little to no experience with the equipment their students are using.

The new machines will be used in the education program's learning technology course and in modules in other education courses, focusing on a wide range of computer applications, including geographic information systems, and addressing the theory and practice of technology education.

PRESIDENT HUGGINS ATTENDS CLINTON GLOBAL INITIATIVE UNIVERSITY

UMM President **Cynthia Huggins** was one of only two Maine college presidents to attend the second annual Clinton Global Initiative University (CGI U) on February 13-15. Held this year at the University of Texas at Austin, CGI U is a yearly gathering of approximately 1,000 college students, university presidents, and youth leaders who come together to address some of the world's most pressing issues.

Each CGI U attendee is required to make a "Commitment to Action" in one of four targeted areas: energy and climate change, human rights and peace, global health, or poverty alleviation. "Greening the O'Brien House," UMM's Commitment to Action, was featured on-stage at the CGI U as an exemplary approach to addressing a specific global challenge. (See related story on front cover.)

"To be recognized by the Clinton Global Initiative University for our focus on the environmental liberal arts is an honor," said Huggins. "Greening the O'Brien House is an initiative that will do great things for the community and our students."

CAN YOU HEAR ME NOW? WUMM EXPANDS SIGNAL

UMM is making noise from Milbridge to Eastport thanks to a recent upgrade to the campus radio station. WUMM-FM 91.7, the student radio station at UMM, was recently upgraded with a 100-watt transmitter. The new transmitter gives the station the ability

to broadcast within at least a 30-mile radius of campus.

Established in 1997, WUMM has been broadcasting for nearly 12 years on a small one watt signal. Since its inception, the station has been a well-kept secret that only campus residents were able to pick up.

WUMM is an entirely student-run operation, funded by the Student Activity Fee Fund. Daniel Swain, a third-year history major from Canaan, Maine, serves as the station's general manager. In addition to Swain, there is an assistant manager and more than 20 students, faculty, and community members hosting radio shows on a weekly basis.

UMM has launched the Machias Environmental Summer Session for Youth (MESSY) for the summer of 2009. Focused on environmental stewardship, MESSY is a week-long residential camp for students entering grades 7 through 9.

MESSY is designed to promote awareness, build knowledge, and stimulate active and creative approaches to environmental stewardship and sustainability. Campers will have the opportunity to work alongside University faculty, actively participating in important work in the field and in the classroom.

MARY CATHCART TO ADDRESS THE CLASS OF 2009

Mary Cathcart, senior policy associate at the Margaret Chase Smith Policy Center, will deliver the keynote address at UMM's 98th commencement ceremony on May 16.

Cathcart served in the Maine House of Representatives (1988–1994) and in the Maine Senate (1996–2004). During her time in the Maine statehouse, she served on a number of legislative committees, including Education and Cultural Affairs, Labor, Judiciary, and Appropriations and Financial Affairs. She chaired the Joint Select Committee on Research and Development and the Children's Mental Health Oversight Committee.

In recognition for her volunteer and political work on behalf of women and children, Cathcart received the 2006 Maryann Hartman Award from the University of Maine.

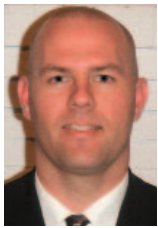
UMM HISTORY BOOK TO BE UNVEILED AT COMMENCEMENT

UMM *President's Corner*



From Washington State Normal School, to Washington State Teachers College, Washington State College, Washington State College of the University of Maine, and finally the University of Maine at Machias. Many of our alumni can proudly recite not only the names, but also the years during which UMM bore its past monikers.

Colleges have other important identifiers as well. For example, we are fortunate that somewhere along the way, someone decided that UMM's colors would be green and white, appropriate for an Environmental Liberal Arts institution. The venerable old ship's wheel has long been a handy logo, adaptable for a variety of uses and venues. And although the stately clipper ship doesn't easily lend itself to a costume and the sidelines at a soccer game, the ship's captain—aka Cappy—is a colorful stand-in.

One of a college's most important identifiers is its tagline, which gets used in many places—signs, advertisements, bumper stickers, letterhead, Web sites, sweatshirts, coffee mugs, and so on. For several years, UMM's tagline proudly touted its small classes and close student-faculty interaction. But you don't have to look far these days to realize that *UMM: A Personal Approach to Education* does little to set us apart from the other bazillion colleges that boast of small classes and close interaction between students and faculty. Nor does it do anything to emphasize the university's vitally important connection to its unusual coastal location.

So we began casting about for a few carefully chosen words that would truly do UMM justice. Eventually we landed on one simple word that efficiently and effectively conveys the who, what, and

where of the University of Maine at Machias in these early years of the twenty-first century—*Naturally!* As an Environmental Liberal Arts college, we believe that our unique location on the unspoiled, rocky coast of Maine is one of our greatest assets. UMM is taking full advantage of our location by integrating our traditional liberal arts curriculum into the natural, cultural, and economic environments of coastal Maine. Our unique location is the genesis and framework for a UMM education, as it has been for many years.

We also believe that our remarkable location has dramatically influenced the kind of people—students, faculty, and staff—who have been drawn to this small, rural campus. The University of Maine at Machias cannot be defined by its eleven buildings, forty acres of land, or thirteen degree programs. The history of this university does not reside in the names of its presidents, the year of its founding, or its membership in the University of Maine System. Instead, UMM's history is most accurately portrayed through the lives of the students, faculty, and staff members who over the past century have come together here on this campus to create and sustain a unique, close-knit intellectual community.

One last thought about taglines. Although it was ultimately (and justifiably) discarded, the tagline suggested by our chief financial officer deserves recording for posterity. *UMM—It's Worth the Drive!* It sounds like a tagline that a CFO would suggest, doesn't it? Obviously the first thought to pop into a reader's mind is "Whoa, exactly how far is it to Machias?" Not exactly the desired effect, and yet the underlying message is right on target. UMM—and the unique educational experience that our students receive here—is definitely worth whatever effort it takes to get here. Indeed, it has been worth it for one hundred years.
